have been ...ing

Use the present perfect continuous for:

1. saying how long you have been doing something (action = not finished)

I have been running for 1 hour

I have been eating lunch with him every Friday since December

2. talking about something you have only just finished doing which is important to now

Look who's home. And it looks like she has been shopping.

'Why are you sweating?'

'Oh, I've been running.'

Stative verbs (verbs which describe something true i.e. be, like, love, have, etc.) do not usually take -ing, so do not usually use the continuous (-ing) tenses.

Idioms

down the drain a complete waste (often used for money)
